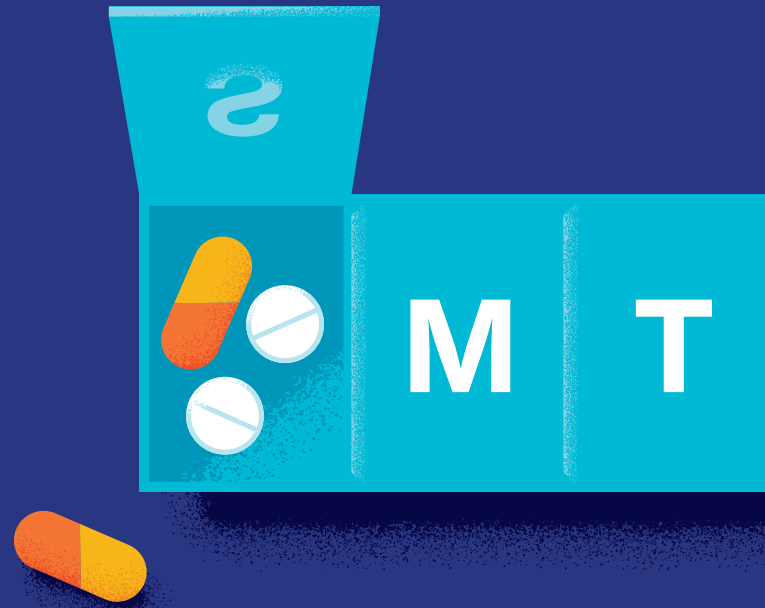




One co-payment for dosage prescribed

If you require multiple prescriptions of the same medication in different strengths to achieve your required dose, you may be only responsible for one copayment under your plan.

For example, your healthcare provider prescribes you a medication that requires a dosage of 15mg. However, the only available tablets are 5mg and 10mg. In this case, your healthcare provider may write two separate prescriptions (one for 5mg and another for 10mg) to add up to the required dosage of 15mg. When this happens, you may be required to pay a copayment for each prescription strength when you obtain your medication from the pharmacy.

To minimize your cost, you can:



Ask your healthcare provider to switch to a single strength for you to achieve this same dose. Using the example above, you may be able to achieve the same dose with 3 tablets of the 5mg strength. If your medication has a quantity limit, your healthcare provider may need to request an **exception**.



Remain on multiple strengths. Each time you fill your prescriptions, ask your pharmacy to contact Optum Rx for an override. Your pharmacy can contact Optum Rx at the number listed on your health plan ID card.
